IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- Cadets will be provided a uniform on LOAN for the training year. It is expected the cadets wash and care for the uniform as instructed. The uniform as a whole, or any part of it, shall only be worn for cadet approved activities. If a cadet wishes to use the uniform for any other purpose they must get permission from the Commanding Officer to the event. In the event of loss or damage to the uniform, parents will be charged for the replacement of missing or damaged parts.
- Regular attendance is important to the program. However in the event that your cadet will be unable to attend please contact us. FYI there are attendance awards that each cadet is eligible for. When we are not contacted about an absence from a regular parade night it affects their consideration for certain awards.
- The Branch Committee is a very important part of our program. Without it our program could not function.

Lieutenant Bonnie Moon:


